- Organized two inflatable hospitals and a blood bank
- Brought in 1.300 tons of materials
- Helped 12.924 injuries and performed 1.427 operations.

QuickTime[™] and a TIFF (Uncompressed) decompressor are needed to see this picture. The USNS (United States Naval Ship) is the largest hospital ship in the world, weighing just over 70,000 tons. So far, it has performed over 200 operations, 20 of them a case of amputation or death. Last week, the first baby ever to be born on the ship was delivered; a healthy baby boy. Despite depleted supplies, doctors continue saving lives.
